Scheme Manager's Report

Home-Start Herefordshire has had another extremely positive year in terms of service delivery. We successfully delivered the 2nd year of a 2 year contract commissioned by Herefordshire Council providing "targeted volunteer support for vulnerable families with children aged 0 to 19 years". 52 families were supported through the contract and in helping these families we provided 1,530 hours of volunteer befriending support. It is a pleasure to see all the parents, children and young people who provided feedback on the service reported 100% satisfaction.

Parents'/Carers' quotes

- "Our volunteer helped me with strategies around routines including help with bed times and eating. She helped with cooking, supporting me at meetings and making sense of what was being said"
- "Since a volunteer has been visiting our granddaughter we have seen a marked improvement in her behaviour, she has flourished when cooking, reads more and is generally very excited and looks forward to the visits"
- "My son looked forward to the volunteer visits; he enjoyed the physical activities they did together, something that I can't do due to my long term health problems. It was so beneficial for my son to have a positive male role model"

Due to the ongoing success of our work for the council, we were delighted when in February this year we were awarded a double contract to provide our targeted befriending support for a greater number of vulnerable families living in the county of Herefordshire.

In addition to our council contract we have also successfully delivered the 1st year of a 3 year project funded by BBC Children In Need which has allowed us to provide befriending/mentoring support for 77 children aged 5 to 14 years who were struggling with various issues including - those at risk of family breakdown, poor attainment and attendance at school, risky behaviour, social isolation, self-harming, domestic abuse and/or low self-esteem. Again we have received positive feedback from the children and professionals alike, who have reported improved relationships with parents, increased self esteem and better attainment, attitude and attendance in school since Home-Start Herefordshire's involvement.

Home-Start Herefordshire is committed to provide effective support to families using our service and we keep children's welfare at the heart of everything we do. With this in mind we have started to use child friendly resources (evaluation and feedback) allowing us through our service delivery to remain child focused and consider the child's view ("through the eyes of child").

Home-Start Herefordshire continues to offer incredible support and is really making the difference to the lives to some of the most vulnerable families living in the county, but without our volunteers none of this would be possible, so we are pleased to say that this has been very busy in terms of volunteer recruitment and we are delighted that we have managed to recruit and train a truly diverse team of volunteers who are now supporting families all over the county.

In addition to our 10 week accredited training programme, we have also provided further training opportunities for staff and volunteers on the Teenage Brain, Healthy Lifestyles, Domestic Abuse, The Angry Child, Fragile Male, Solution Focused Approach and Changing Behaviours, all of which has developed our knowledge and supported our work with children 0-19 years. As well as volunteer training opportunities we continue to offer

Home-Start Herefordshire as a training placement for social work students, during the year 4 university students have undertaken a placement with us. A huge thank you to Diane who as the students Work Place Practice Educator has worked tirelessly to ensure the students time with us is such a valuable learning experience.

Here at Home-Start Herefordshire we use many different avenues to capture feedback from our volunteer workforce, this is extremely important to us, ensuring we hear their voice and use it positively to influence future service delivery. It was from this feedback we re-instated our volunteer peer support meetings in addition to our training programme. I am delighted to say that the meetings have been a great success with volunteers providing a valuable role in supporting and sharing experiences with others. "An excellent support meeting I found it empowering!" (Volunteer)

In addition to our core befriending service, we continue to run family groups in Ross and Kington with generous funding support from the New Grove Trust, Kington United Charities and the Cooperative Community Fund. These groups have provided children with safe and stimulating play spaces for fun and exploration and one to one parenting support for those families needing an extra helping hand. Further developments this year have seen staff and volunteers working at our family groups taking part in our new HSUK Group Workers Training programme which covered topics such as safeguarding and volunteer group supervision. Thank you to the staff and volunteers whose hard work at the groups make them the success they are.

Home-Start Herefordshire prides itself in offering a quality service and to ensure we achieve this we undertake an ongoing cycle of quality assurance self assessment, measuring our work against HSUK set quality assurance standards. In February we started the initial stages of our standard QA review conducted by Home-Start Herefordshire UK and in August this year we will undergo an enhanced level QA assessment endorsed by the Charity Commission, a full report will be available in the autumn (2014). Throughout this ongoing cycle of QA assessment we have captured feedback from service users/ referrers about our service delivery.



Chair's Report

What a busy and interesting year it has been for all of us at HSH!

Our two largest contracts with Herefordshire Council and Children in Need require us to work in new ways: working with families with children over 5 years of age as well as those under 5, short term 12 week placements in families rather than open-ended relationships and working with some high level cases.

Recently the trustees evaluated how these new approaches have worked now that they have been in place for over a year and we were pleased that our conclusions were very positive. In some critical ways the scheme has benefitted from them:

- HSH training has been extended and adapted to cover these new changes and is now comprehensive and a model for other schemes
- Both staff members and volunteers have risen to the challenge of working with high level cases and careful and regular monitoring has improved governance
- The agreed short term placements with families mean everyone is benefitting from the greater clarity that results both in outcomes and timescale
- There is an evidenced need for work with children over 5 years of age and they are clearly benefitting from our support for them

However we do need to monitor referrals and cases to ensure we have a good balance of ages across our caseloads and that we do not lose our early years skills. Any feedback from volunteers or stakeholders about these changes would be very welcome.

Meanwhile Home Start UK carried out a Quality Assurance Inspection in February and I am glad to say we had a very positive result with only a few relatively minor actions to make us fully compliant. These have now been done and we hope to gain full accreditation in August 2014. Next year we will continue our on-going cycle of quality assurance assessment and review.

Next year will be as busy as ever as we

- Offer ongoing accredited training and development for our volunteers, (including trustees). This will include modules on depression, maximising income and managing endings
- Continue to evaluate and develop a child friendly toolkit so that we are always child focused ("through the eyes of a child")
- Continue to develop and deliver our targeted core service to families with children aged between 0 and 19 years old
- Continue training placements for social work and university students
- Explore further possibilities of partnership working including local authority commissioning
- Continue to develop our volunteer support groups giving opportunities for consultation, evaluation and further development
- Develop policies on bullying and cyber bullying safeguarding remains one of our main focuses
- Launch a service user feedback group to give us opportunities to look at current service delivery and future development
- Launch a new "Money for Life Service" to support vulnerable families to manage their day to day finances

It will be an exciting journey - I do hope you will travel with us!

My thanks go as always to our splendid and dedicated staff, trustees and volunteers and all those who have helped us this year with funding, support and in so many other ways – we are fortunate to have so many good friends.

This year we have supported 339 Children in families, including 188 under 5s

A Family's Story - Lisa and Tim Marshall

In August 2004 I had my twenty-week scan and was told my unborn baby had a 'diaphragmatic hernia' with a possible 40% survival rate. I was given the option not to have the baby or to carry on with the possibility of the baby not surviving the birth. After a lot of heartache we decided to carry on with the pregnancy and let nature decide.

Luisa was born at the end of December and she survived! She had her Diaphragmatic Hernia repair and after a seven month stay in Bristol Children's Hospital, Luisa finally came home for the first time in July.

To have the task of looking after a baby on oxygen, with a constant feed, plus two young other children was an enormous task to hand. The adrenalin of the fact that Luisa was finally home was really what kept us going. To begin with we tried to do it all ourselves. Family were around, but with their work commitments and my family in Somerset it was just fleeting visits. The enormity of daily tasks plus the care of Luisa and the boys did, after a few months, take a toll. This is where Linda our Home-Start Herefordshire volunteer was an incredible help to us.

Tim is a self-employed hairdresser often working past 7pm. Linda started by visiting twice a week, 4-6pm, helping with that really busy time of day. Without fail Linda would turn up, a smile on her face and an extra pair of hands, giving the boys that extra attention that I could not give whilst I did tube feeds and medicines. She helped at meal times so we could encourage and teach Luisa to eat and at bedtime to get everyone ready for bed. Linda has helped us go out for days that would have been very, very difficult on my own especially when you have an oxygen bag and feeding bag in tow.

I have vowed when my free time comes and my children have grown up - CALL ME UP Home-Start Herefordshire, time and an extra pair of hand is the best gift you can give.

Seven years later, Luisa is nine years old and tube free. What a miracle!!

Ten years ago we were given the option not to have this child due to the medical situation, but a couple of years of heartache and hard work is worth a life time of happiness. The gruelling 7 months she spent in hospital is now a distant memory.

Now Luisa runs around and plays like any other child, and she eats everything! The muscles have tightened as she has grown and developed, allowing food to go down and stay down.

HOME-START Herefordshire helped us through those difficult and emotional years with practical help and most importantly, MUCH NEEDED EMOTIONAL SUPPORT.

When children are young, even in a healthy normal situation, it can be very demanding. Parents need practical help and a friend they can talk to.

In this safe, secure environment our befriending family group supports young families living in and around Ross-On-Wye. We are grateful for the constant support of the staff at the Children's Centre, In particular Paula, who gives time and resources that helps complement what we offer.

In conjunction with the toy library group, the families who visit us can access the health visitor clinic and the

breast feeding clinic at the same time.

The past 12 months at the group have been particularly enjoyable. A wide diversity of nationalities have attended the group: as well as British it's been a

pleasure to welcome families from Eastern Europe, South Africa and Venezuela. Carers are as likely to attend as mums, dads, grandparents, foster parents and child minders. What a wonderful mix of people comfortably interacting and sharing experiences with developing youngsters!

A survey conducted to discover ways to improve the toy library was unanimous in its support. "More of the same please". Many requests for additional sessions during the long summer holiday have been acknowledged. We are now opening for an extra 2 days during this August.

We use weekly themes eg. "fireman Sam" the use of literature and activities relevant to fire safety can be accessed by carers, while the children enjoy happy role play, including riding on toy fire engines. Lots of our activities take place in the garden adjoining our indoor space; it's here where fine and gross motor skills develop whilst building up their appetite for the healthy snack we provide.

Carers have plenty of opportunities to talk in confidence about any anxieties that they may be having and when appropriate are signposted to relevant professional services.

Thank you to the valuable input from the social work students, in particularly Tracey for her assistance with toddler twins and their mum. Finally a huge THANK YOU to Jo who is leaving us, Jo a Home-Start Herefordshire volunteer has been greeting all the carers with a smile and has been preparing the drinks and healthy snacks for the children. We shall all miss her but we hope she can return to us in the near future.

Treasurer's Report

Income decreased by 8% during the year mainly reflecting the end of funding from Lloyds TSB which we were unable to replace. Despite several major fund raising initiatives during the year we failed to develop any significant new funding opportunities and were particularly disappointed that the considerable work involved in our Lottery application was ultimately unsuccessful.

Some expenditure savings were made resulting in a reduction of 1% in expenditure. However, these savings were insufficient to offset the fall in income. As a result the deficit for the year on core operations increased to £13,165 (2013: deficit of £1,952). The deficit has been set against reserves from previous years to leave unrestricted reserves at 31 March 2014 of £38,184.

Our current unrestricted reserves only provide minimum cover for emergencies such as shortfalls in funding or unexpected expenditure. The Trustees continue to believe that reserves equivalent to 6 months expenditure, i.e. in excess of £70,000, are the optimum required to ensure continuity of operations and will continue to work towards this goal. However, although the current reserves only provide for 3 months of expenditure cover, the Trustees believe this is sufficient to meet the minimum required to continue operations. The additional income secured from Herefordshire Council for the coming year should also ensure we are able to at least break even in this year.

Amounts were received from Eveson Charitable Trust, Herefordshire Council, Four Acre Trust, BBC Children in Need, Herefordshire Community Foundation, Cadbury, The Army Fund, EF Bulmer Benevolent Fund, Southall Trust, New Grove Trust, Pontrilas Development, Kington United Church and Cooperative Community Fund. We are grateful for their support.

In addition money was received in the form of donations from individuals and the proceeds from fund raising events. We are grateful to the donors for their generosity and to all those involved in fund raising events for their hard work and commitment.
