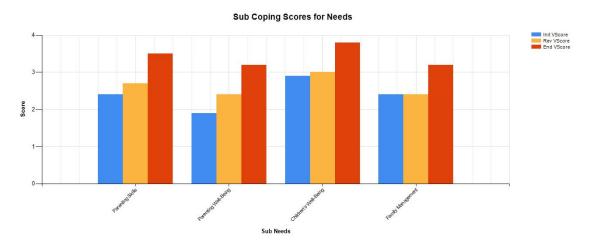

## **Trustees' Report**

The trustees, who are directors for the purposes of company law, present the annual report together with the financial statements of the charitable company for the year ended 31 March 2017.

#### Achievements and Performance 2016/2017

Home-Start has had another really positive year in terms of service delivery helping 267 families (461 children) compared to 208 families (389 children) in 2015/16. We have continued to provide effective volunteer home-visiting support for 150 vulnerable families (323 children) living in the county, with a further 117 families (138 children) receiving early intervention support through our universal group provision, of these **153** children referred as needing help were aged between 0-5yrs receiving emotional, practical and behavioural support and **170** children were aged between 5-19yrs receiving emotional, mentoring and behavioural support.



See Coping Scores for Needs above which shows that during the year improvements were made with 150 families (323 children) who were identified at initial assessment as needing support with parenting skills, parenting wellbeing, children's wellbeing and family management

Through our Targeted Family Support contract commissioned by Herefordshire Council, we have made a valuable contribution to improve the life chances of 66 families struggling with challenging and anti-social child behaviour, mental health issues affecting both parents and children, children living in poverty, domestic abuse & violence, school absenteeism and low academic achievement, substance abuse ,overcrowded housing & poor living conditions. We were able to offer a responsive "personalised" service for these families, empowering them to identify the changes they wished to make, whilst supporting them to achieve their goals. Working closely with parents and children, agreeing their needs and their priorities, brought about steady and long-term change in the life chances of the families supported. These positive outcomes have been evidenced through feedback from the parents themselves.

"Home-Start have helped giving me confidence in myself and my ability to be a good mum, she (volunteer) made me see my feelings and anxieties are normal - I could talk to her about anything as she didn't judge me."

"Mum said she valued how R talked to her openly and honestly which helped her to understand how she behaves effects the child & how she needed to be consistent with her boundaries."

" The volunteer was easy to talk to, she helped me to sit back and reflect on things, to take small steps to manage my problems. I have been very pleased with the end result, I now realise people are here to help not to judge"

## **Trustees' Report**

Throughout our work we ensure we keep children's welfare at the heart of everything we do, by delivering a service that is child focused and most importantly effective in meeting their individual needs. It is with the continued support of BBC Children in Need that we have been able to deliver our direct befriending/mentoring support for children aged 5 to 14 years. Male & female volunteer/mentors have been instrumental in helping to improve children's mental health & wellbeing, improve their attainment & attendance at school, help rebuild fragile parent/child relationships, reduce the impact of domestic abuse as well as ensuring the child's thoughts and feeling are listened to and considered.

"Before he (volunteer) came I felt scared and worried, he helped me to learn to control my anger. I now feel happy and less angry and get on better with mum."

"Before she (volunteer) came I felt sad, annoyed & depressed, but since she came to help she has made such a difference, she made me feel safer and happier - I think she was amazing."

"Before she came (volunteer) I felt stressed, boxed up & lonely. I really liked talking to her, she helped me understand what was going on - I now feel happy, open & joyful- I love Home-Start."

We have had another positive year in terms of volunteer recruitment, successfully recruiting and training 23 new volunteers, who included 21 home-visiting volunteers & 2 volunteer trustees. A warm welcome to all the new volunteers who joined us this year and a sad farewell to those who have left us, we are truly grateful for the difference you have made to the lives of the families you've supported. We greatly value the contribution made by our volunteer team and actively seek their views in regard to their volunteering experience. Through regular peer support meetings, supervision & social events we are able to capture volunteer feedback ensuring their experience is as rewarding for them as it is for the families they support.

Volunteer feedback...

"I found the whole experience a wonderful exercise of how a simple thing of boosting a confidence is all it takes to put a family back on track."

"I have found it a privilege to be welcomed into peoples' homes & have been grateful for this opportunity."

Volunteer & staff training & development continues to be a priority for the organisation. This year as well the 40 hours of preparation training we have also offered various training opportunities including BHBF (school & nursery readiness), Money for Life (budgeting & money management), Domestic Abuse (supporting victims of DV) Heart-Start (life saving first aid) as well as new safeguarding refresher training which covered topics on CSE (Child Sexual Exploitation), voice of the child & internet safety.

In addition to our comprehensive volunteer & staff training programme we continue to offer a valuable learning opportunity for both social work and university students who have chosen to undertake work experience placements with us, this year 9 students have trained with us.

## **Trustees' Report**

Volunteer feedback......

"My Home-Start experience has been excellent. The training has been so professional and really equipped me for my work as a volunteer."

"My positive experience with Home-Start, led me to study and complete a relevant degree at university. All the staff were a great support, who believed in me all the way."

A grant from the Army Central Fund allowed us to provide support for a number of families who have a parent serving in the armed forces. Parents referred for support were struggling with various issues including, depression, isolation, accessing services and managing children's behaviour. Often parents emotional health was greatly affected due to being relocated to an area miles from friends and family, coupled with the added worry about their partners who were away on tour for prolonged periods of time. Thanks to the help & support of their volunteers we have seen a great improvement in the parent's emotional health and wellbeing, which in turn benefits their children.

Feedback from a serving father.....

"He values Home-Start and the support the volunteer provides his wife and children as he feels helpless when he's away on tour and worries about his family, at least he knows the volunteer is there to help and support for his wife and children in his absence."

In addition to our core befriending service we continue to run family groups in Ross and Kington with generous funding from The New Grove Trust & Kington United Charities. The groups have been essential in providing fun & friendship to young families who are living in some of the most isolated areas of rural Herefordshire. A big thank you to our wonderful group coordinators Tam & Kay, play leader Kim & volunteers Sue, Gail, Caroline & Janet who are always on hand to provide gentle guidance & support.

#### Plans for the future

To continue to review our current training programme and promote the delivery of accredited training opportunity "Supporting a family by Home visiting", for our experienced volunteers, providing an opportunity to continue their own personal development whilst also volunteering for Home-Start Herefordshire.

Continue our on-going cycle of quality assurance assessment; self assessing against the new condensed 4 QA standards (Governance, People Management, Managing Information & Safeguarding /Child Protection).

Offer ongoing accredited preparation and training opportunities for our volunteer, trustee & staff team, which will include modules on, BHBF, domestic abuse, money for life, data protection, first aid, safeguarding and managing endings.

To evaluate & develop a child friendly toolkit (evaluation & feedback) ensuring that through our service delivery we always remain child focused ("through the eyes of a child").

Continue to develop and deliver our targeted core service to families with children aged between 0 and 18 years old. Ongoing evaluation of our work.

Continue to offer Home-Start as a training placement for social work, university and work experience students.

Explore the possibility of partnership working especially relating to local authority commissioning.

Continue to develop our volunteer peer support groups giving an opportunity for consultation, evaluation and further development.

Continue to develop the role of the family representative.

## **Trustees' Report**

Safeguarding remains one of our main focuses and we hope to develop our own volunteer safeguarding training to reflect any changes to national or local policy or procedures.

To explore 3 year funding opportunities to increase the delivery of our "Money for Life Service" to support more vulnerable families to manage their day to day finances including guidance on budgeting, saving, consumer rights & responsibilities.

Through our new BHBF (Big Hopes, Big Futures) service, sustain and, if possible, increase our current level of support to children. Making sure we can play a significant preventative role through early intervention with young children. Among a long list of difficulties, we know that poverty, domestic abuse and substance misuse (in particular of alcohol) have especially devastating effects on families. In order to achieve our goal of giving young children the best start, we need to make sure that we are in a position to support them at a very young age to alleviate the problems that their families are experiencing. This early intervention will continue to be a major focus over the coming year.

To review ongoing expenditure and fund raising opportunities with a view to putting the Charity on a more stable long term footing.

#### Financial review

Certain funds received by the charity can only be used for specified purposes. The income and expenditure relating thereto is shown in the accounts as restricted. Restricted funds at the end of the year represent amounts received but not yet spent on restricted activities.

Incoming resources decreased by 12% to £154,873 (2016: £176,100). Total expenditure increased by 4% to £169,765 (2016: £162,886. The fall in income mainly results from the ending of income from West Mercia Police and Crime Commissioner during the year and the increase in expenditure generally reflects inflationary increases in staff and volunteer costs. The resulting deficit for the year on core activities was £7,823 (2016: £4,443 surplus). The deficit for the year has been deducted from reserves of previous years.

Our current unrestricted reserves only provide minimum cover for emergencies such as shortfalls in funding or unexpected expenditure. The Trustees continue to believe that reserves equivalent to 6 months expenditure, i.e. in excess of £80,000, are the optimum required to ensure continuity of operations and will continue to work towards this goal. However, although the current reserves only provide for 3 months of expenditure cover (2016: 4 months), the Trustees believe this is sufficient to meet the minimum required to continue operations in the short term at least.

Amounts were received from Eveson Charitable Trust, Herefordshire Council, BBC Children in Need, New Grove Trust, Cadbury, The Army Fund, EF Bulmer Benevolent Fund, Southall Trust, West Mercia Police & Crime Commissioner, Pontrilas Development, Kington United Charity and HFT Forklifts. We are grateful for their support. In addition money was received in the form of donations from individuals and the proceeds from fund raising events. We are grateful to the donors for their generosity and to all those involved in fund raising events for their hard work and commitment.

#### Notes to the Financial Statements for the Year Ended 31 March 2017

#### 1 Charity status

The charity is a charity limited by guarantee and consequently does not have share capital. Each of the trustees is liable to contribute an amount not exceeding £Nil towards the assets of the charity in the event of liquidation.

#### 2 Accounting policies

#### Summary of significant accounting policies and key accounting estimates

The principal accounting policies applied in the preparation of these financial statements are set out below. These policies have been consistently applied to all the years presented, unless otherwise stated.

#### Statement of compliance

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015) - (Charities SORP (FRS 102)), the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) and the Companies Act 2006.

#### **Basis of preparation**

Home-Start Herefordshire meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS 102. Assets and liabilities are initially recognised at historical cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant accounting policy notes.

#### Going concern

The trustees consider that there are no material uncertainties about the charity's ability to continue as a going concern nor any significant areas of uncertainty that affect the carrying value of assets held by the charity.

#### Exemption from preparing a cash flow statement

The charity opted to early adopt Bulletin 1 published on 2 February 2016 and have therefore not included a cash flow statement in these financial statements.

#### **Income and endowments**

All income is recognised once the charity has entitlement to the income, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount of the income receivable can be measured reliably.

#### **Donations and legacies**

Donations are recognised when the charity has been notified in writing of both the amount and settlement date. In the event that a donation is subject to conditions that require a level of performance by the charity before the charity is entitled to the funds, the income is deferred and not recognised until either those conditions are fully met, or the fulfilment of those conditions is wholly within the control of the charity and it is probable that these conditions will be fulfilled in the reporting period.

#### Notes to the Financial Statements for the Year Ended 31 March 2017

#### **Expenditure**

All expenditure is recognised once there is a legal or constructive obligation to that expenditure, it is probable settlement is required and the amount can be measured reliably. All costs are allocated to the applicable expenditure heading that aggregate similar costs to that category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated on a basis consistent with the use of resources, with central staff costs allocated on the basis of time spent, and depreciation charges allocated on the portion of the asset's use. Other support costs are allocated based on the spread of staff costs.

#### Raising funds

These are costs incurred in attracting voluntary income, the management of investments and those incurred in trading activities that raise funds.

#### Charitable activities

Charitable expenditure comprises those costs incurred by the charity in the delivery of its activities and services for its beneficiaries. It includes both costs that can be allocated directly to such activities and those costs of an indirect nature necessary to support them.

#### **Support costs**

Support costs include central functions and have been allocated to activity cost categories on a basis consistent with the use of resources, for example, allocating property costs by floor areas, or per capita, staff costs by the time spent and other costs by their usage.

#### **Governance costs**

These include the costs attributable to the charity's compliance with constitutional and statutory requirements, including audit, strategic management and trustees's meetings and reimbursed expenses.

#### **Taxation**

The charity is considered to pass the tests set out in Paragraph 1 Schedule 6 of the Finance Act 2010 and therefore it meets the definition of a charitable company for UK corporation tax purposes. Accordingly, the charity is potentially exempt from taxation in respect of income or capital gains received within categories covered by Chapter 3 Part 11 of the Corporation Tax Act 2010 or Section 256 of the Taxation of Chargeable Gains Act 1992, to the extent that such income or gains are applied exclusively to charitable purposes.

## Tangible fixed assets

Individual fixed assets costing £0.00 or more are initially recorded at cost, less any subsequent accumulated depreciation and subsequent accumulated impairment losses.

#### Depreciation and amortisation

Depreciation is provided on tangible fixed assets so as to write off the cost or valuation, less any estimated residual value, over their expected useful economic life as follows:

#### **Current asset investments**

Current asset investments are included at current market value.

#### Trade debtors

Trade debtors are amounts due from customers for merchandise sold or services performed in the ordinary course of business.

#### Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents comprise cash on hand and call deposits, and other short-term highly liquid investments that are readily convertible to a known amount of cash and are subject to an insignificant risk of change in value.

#### **Trade creditors**

Trade creditors are obligations to pay for goods or services that have been acquired in the ordinary course of business from suppliers. Accounts payable are classified as current liabilities if the charity does not have an unconditional right, at the end of the reporting period, to defer settlement of the creditor for at least twelve months after the reporting date. If there is an unconditional right to defer settlement for at least twelve months after the reporting date, they are presented as non-current liabilities.

#### **Fund structure**

Unrestricted income funds are general funds that are available for use at the trustees's discretion in furtherance of the objectives of the charity.

Restricted income funds are those donated for use in a particular area or for specific purposes, the use of which is restricted to that area or purpose.

#### **Financial instruments**

#### Classification

Financial assets and financial liabilities are recognised when the charity becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

Financial liabilities and equity instruments are classified according to the substance of the contractual arrangements entered into. An equity instrument is any contract that evidences a residual interest in the assets of the charity after deducting all of its liabilities.

#### Notes to the Financial Statements for the Year Ended 31 March 2017

#### Recognition and measurement

All financial assets and liabilities are initially measured at transaction price (including transaction costs), except for those financial assets classified as at fair value through profit or loss, which are initially measured at fair value (which is normally the transaction price excluding transaction costs), unless the arrangement constitutes a financing transaction. If an arrangement constitutes a financing transaction, the financial asset or financial liability is measured at the present value of the future payments discounted at a market rate of interest for a similar debt instrument.

Financial assets and liabilities are only offset in the statement of financial position when, and only when there exists a legally enforceable right to set off the recognised amounts and the charity intends either to settle on a net basis, or to realise the asset and settle the liability simultaneously.

Financial assets are derecognised when and only when a) the contractual rights to the cash flows from the financial asset expire or are settled, b) the charity transfers to another party substantially all of the risks and rewards of ownership of the financial asset, or c) the charity, despite having retained some, but not all, significant risks and rewards of ownership, has transferred control of the asset to another party.

Financial liabilities are derecognised only when the obligation specified in the contract is discharged, cancelled or expires.
